A quick guide for parents who feel the school and exam system isn't working for their child.



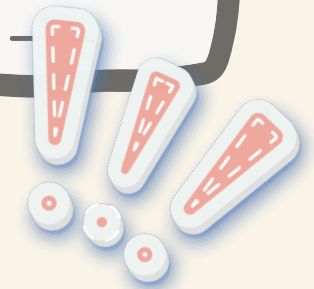
What the law actually says




Parents must ensure their child receives a suitable education from age 5-16.

The law does **NOT** say this must happen in school.


Education should be suitable for the child's age, ability and needs.



What is NOT legally required

- 
- Attending mainstream school
 - Sitting SATs
 - Sitting GCSE exams
 - Following the national curriculum exactly
 - Remaining in school if it is harming wellbeing

Alternative pathways

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- Elective home education
 - Online schools or flexible learning
 - Alternative provision
 - Functional Skills instead of GCSEs
 - Apprenticeships and vocational routes after 16

What home education can actually look like

If you opt for home education, it doesn't have to resemble a traditional setup of sitting for six hours a day while reciting the curriculum!

- Learning to cook meals and understand nutrition
- Managing money and everyday life skills
- Exploring nature and the environment
- Visiting cities and learning about culture and history
- Creative projects, art, music and practical skills

Policy changes

Education policy can change over time.

White papers discuss potential school reforms.

At the time of writing, home education and alternatives to GCSEs remain legal options BUT this could change...

Always check the latest Department for Education guidance.

Why I made this decision

I stopped my son doing SATs and later GCSEs because I could see the impact they were having on his self-esteem and mental health.

It wasn't about rebelling against the system.
It was about protecting his wellbeing.

And all exams were doing was reinforcing what he couldn't do! And I wasn't gonna continue to watch that unfold.
